When making the Girl Scout Promise, individuals may substitute wording appropriate to their own spiritual beliefs for the word ‘God’” (Blue Book of Basic Documents, 2006)</p> <p>“Avoid reference to ‘God’ as being a specific deity.” (www.girlscouts.org, 2005)</p>
Value of Life	<p>Pro-life, believes in the dignity and sanctity of life.</p> <p>(AHG Statement of Faith)</p>	<p>No official position (Blue Book of Basic Documents)</p> <p>However, GSUSA CEO, Kathy Cloninger, admitted on the “Today Show” 3/5/04, “We have relationships ... with Planned Parenthood ... across the country”</p> <p>WAGGGS promotes on their website a campaign for “sexual and reproductive rights”, including “emergency contraception in order to avoid unintended pregnancies” and “accessible, affordable ... abortions” (www.wagggs.org , 2010)</p> <p>Encourages re-examination of girls’ values as they mature. (www.girlscouts.org, 2003)</p> <p>WAGGGS honored Nafis Sadik, former Exec. Dir. Of the United Nations Population Fund</p>
Program Ownership	<p>Owned by local chartering organizations (church, private school, etc.)</p>	<p>Troops “owned” by National Organization, GSUSA. (Blue Book of Basic Documents, 2006)</p>
Philosophical Basis	<p>Founded on Biblical principles with definite moral compass of right and wrong. Reflects honored traditions of God, family, and country. (History of AHG, 1995-2008)</p>	<p>“There is no ‘right’ way to live, look, talk, dress, eat or act.” (Brownie Girl Scout Handbook, 1993) (Moral Relativism)</p> <p>“... you can rarely state that something is definitely right or wrong.” (Exploring Spirituality, WAGGGS, 2000)</p> <p>“Reflects the ever changing needs & interests of girls” (www.girlscouts.org, 2003)</p> <p>“Driven by the new realities of our ever-changing world” (www.girlscouts.org , 2007)</p>
Position on Prayer	<p>Encourages prayer at meetings</p>	<p>“Even if your troop is all of one faith, the Girl Scout meeting is not an appropriate place for prayers and hymns.” (www.girlscouts.org, 2003)</p>
Oath/Promise	<p>AHG Oath: I promise to love God, cherish my family, honor my country and serve in my community.</p>	<p>Girl Scout Promise: “On my honor, I will try: to serve God* and my country, to help people at all times and to live by the Girl Scout Law.”</p> <p>*“The word ‘God’ can be interpreted in a number of ways, depending on one’s spiritual beliefs.” When reciting the Promise, this word (God) may be substituted to fit individual girl’s belief system, if any. (www.girlscouts.org, 2008)</p>
